Turn your eyes upon Jesus

A reflection from Sallie



As you perhaps know, we have a dog and I take him for an early morning walk, leaving the house about 5:15-5:30am. After beautiful mornings, seeing the sunrise and walking in the light, the days are now shortening, and I am leaving in the dark. It's 'spider season', and I am usually the first down the path. I find that I'm breaking through many cobwebs. In life we can feel as if darkness is closing in and that we are tangled up. Light puts a different perspective on things – it can even make cobwebs look beautiful, especially when sparkling with dew. I was reminded of a chorus we used to sing:

Turn your eyes upon Jesus, Look full in His wonderful face, And the things of earth will grow strangely dim, In the light of His glory and grace.

How does this happen?

Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). It does not mean that problems go away, but we see them in a different light – one that has Christ's perspective. With this viewpoint, mundane and trivial things that can agitate us day by day lose their impact on our lives. We may be fed up in our tasks, but it helps if we remember: - "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord" (Colossians 3:23). In an ever-changing world, let us always remember WHO is constant, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8).

Turning our eyes upon Jesus is not always easy. I was struck by the Collect for the 10th Sunday after Trinty (NB my emphasis): -

Lord of heaven and earth, as Jesus taught his disciples to be **persistent in prayer**, **give us patience and courage never to lose hope**, **but always to bring our prayers before you**; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

We need to be persistent. It is very easy to become distracted by worldly things both little irritations and larger issues. Sometimes we try and distract ourselves from worries by putting our attention elsewhere, e.g. endless television or scrolling on a phone.

One of the ways we can turn to Jesus is to have some Bible passages of hope that we can repeat. They can help anchor us when we feel all at sea. Here are a few, there may be others that help you. Please share them with us.

- Peace, be still Mark 4:39
- Be still and know that I am God Psalm 46:10
- Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned

- you by name; you are mine. Isaiah 43:1
- God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear Psalm 46:1-2
- Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. – John 14:27

We need to have patience. We get irritated with ourselves because we think we should do better! Be kind to ourselves. Bit by bit, and through God's grace, we will change and our habit of turning to Jesus will be more reliable. It takes courage, because we will be stepping away from what we know, away from our comfort zone. The light that shines may reveal something of ourselves that we need to address which may be uncomfortable.



And prayer?

Remember that we do not always need words, just to be open to the Holy Spirit. The Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. (Romans 8:26)

Let us, then, turn our eyes to Jesus through prayer and the Bible with patience, persistence, courage and hope that the troubles of this world will be changed by the perspective of the Light of the World shining in us and through us.

Collect for the Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity

Almighty God, you search us and know us: may we rely on you in strength and rest on you in weakness, now and in all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

New Worshipping Communities' Event at HTH

Below is an outline of the purpose of the event:

Many people are curious about faith and spirituality, even if they've never been part of a church. But going to a traditional church service can feel intimidating or unfamiliar. Some people worry they won't know what to do, or feel unsure about fitting in—especially if they have young children, are neurodivergent, have disabilities, or simply haven't been to church before.

New Worshipping Communities (NWCs) are a way to make exploring faith more relaxed and welcoming. These gatherings often happen in everyday places - like community centres, cafés, or outdoors - and are designed to be informal, friendly, and easy to join. There's no need to dress up or know special routines. Everyone is welcome, just as they are.

Having NWCs alongside traditional services means there are more ways for people to connect with others, explore faith, and experience God's love—whatever their background or comfort level.

This event will offer inspiring theological input, practical tools, and space to ask questions and form plans in community. We strongly encourage churches to attend in teams—clergy, lay leaders, and anyone with a heart for mission. Let's gather, learn, and grow together in shaping New Worshipping Communities across our region.

Keep your eyes and ears open in the churchyard; there is more wildlife living there than you might think: (see the article about Clark's mining bee on the next page)



Clark's Mining Bee in the Churchyard.

As you walk into the churchyard from the marketplace there is a low bank just inside the gate. This bank is home to a colony of solitary bees. Solitary bees may live in loose colonies but unlike



the social honey bee or bumble bees each female excavates their own nest burrow.

The bees in the churchyard are Clark's mining bees (andrena clarkella). This is a species that often nests among tree roots along the sunny edges of woodland paths and it lives most of its life-cycle underground. The emergence of the adults in early spring is timed to coincide with the unfolding of the willow catkins on which they feed. The adult females collect the pollen to build up a food store within their burrow. The males emerge a few weeks later and can be seen flying low over the bank looking for females. The males visit flowers to feed but after mating take no part in nesting behaviour. The female lays eggs in brood cells within the burrow and the larvae feed on the nectar-rich pollen she has collected. They go through a pupal stage and over-winter underground before the adults emerge the following spring.



It is fascinating to observe the females leaving the burrows to forage and returning with their legs laden with yellow pollen. Females may take some time concealing the entrance to the nest on leaving and close it behind them after entering with a pollen load. This is a defence against cuckoo bees which seek out the

nests when the bee is absent and kill the eggs or larvae before laying their own eggs the larvae of which will feed on the foodstore collected by the

The cuckoo bee species associated with Clark's Mining Bee is the Early

host bee.

Nomad Bee Nomada leucophthalma. The mining bees have evolved strategies such as concealing the burrow to avoid detection by the cuckoo bee while the cuckoo bee has evolved strategies to avoid being detected by its host. A wonderful example of the evolutionary 'arms race' being played out at our feet. Although the cuckoo bee has not been observed here it may well be around and the mining bees have evolved to defend against this cleptoparasite regardless.

It is lovely to watch the bees burrowing and diligently concealing their nests and a privilege to have them living out their lives largely unnoticed alongside us in the centre of town.






He will be playing some gentle piano pieces and some more exciting tunes on the guitar

Newcomers are especially welcome: don't worry if you haven't any food - there's usually plenty.


Painting of St Michael's for Sale


