Looking back, and looking forward

"How was your Christmas?"

"Did you do anything special over New Year?"

I wonder how many times you were asked (or you asked!) either of these questions recently?



If, together, we were to present something similar as a church, there'd be

- a) some common elements and activities as the obvious high points of 2024. What do you think they would be?
- some shared sadnesses, especially as we remember people no longer with us.
- And then the programme might wind up with a much wider array of 'and finally's, as individuals' preferences and levels of engagement affect what's brought to mind for them

Such thoughts about looking back aren't for the sake of seeing last year through rose-tinted spectacles, reminiscing to hold out for a feel-good factor to counter the winter blues of mid-January – though such an emotional boost might be forthcoming. No, the benefit of reviewing the past is to help us see more clearly our future, and – whatever that might look like at the start of the year – how we might be prepared for it and, if we can, act differently for it to be better.

What's prompted such thinking for me (apart from the turn of the calendar to a new year) is the fact that, over a 48-hour period this week I have:

- a) welcomed Vivien Gisby as a new (additional) colleague within St Michael's – a preliminary for which was Vivien and I agreeing how she would serve in this voluntary capacity:
- b) taken part in a review of last year's Crib Service, asking how can we improve it for 2025?
- had an 'MDR' (Ministry Development Review) conversation with Bishop Sam, where I was reflecting on my calling to this parish and the Macclesfield Team and what support and/or adjustments would help me flourish going forwards;
- had a supervision session with Martin Bancroft, our Reader-in-training – reflecting with him about his progress-to-date, prior to his expected licensing (due later this year);
- e) met with Ruth Parker's family to make arrangements for her funeral (at 10am on 27th January in St Michael's) a process that involves remembering her life and seeking to ensure the service is 'Ruth-shaped'.

Also, on Thursday, the Church Council will consider the areas of church life where St Michael's is most vulnerable, such that we might do something proactively about it/them.

Oh, and there's the joy of seeing contractors in the Nave, starting to install temporary lighting, ahead of ripping out and replacing the old lights. What a brighter 2025 we have ahead of us!

Seriously though, through all the above, I hope you can see how – by thinking and/or talking about something of the past, we are seeking to make adjustments and changes for the future to be better?

In personal terms, I hope you see how, by asking Vivien, Martin B or myself appropriate questions, we can identify what energises us – so let's apply those passions and strengths in the best way! – but also what's difficult or drains us? Do we need support and more opportunities to grow in these areas, or simply find other people and ways to minimise any negative impact of such aspects of the role?

So, for you, for 2025, have you thought about an MDR?

If you'd like some help to reflect on 'your ministry' then have a chat with a friend, with Vivien or with me.

A report on Mary and Joseph's journey to the Nativity, from Tricia Atherton


The Posada Journal is available to read: please ask Tricia if you would like to do so.

They attended several Carol services including the Advent Carols, Christingle, Town Carol Service with the Silk Brass Band, the Nativity Service where they enjoyed a story with a difference, the beauty of the singing at the Carols by Candlelight, and eventually they arrived at the Crib Service where the baby was born! At last! They called him Jesus.

Here's a quote from one of the hosts, Rakesh:

"I was wondering what sort of learning I would get from this years' experience of the Posada... When we sat down for prayers before dinner I lit the candle. The wick was too small and it was more or less burnt. However, the light was burning, like a star in a faraway sky. You would have to look twice to see that it was still burning. Sonia started praying and I was wondering if the candle would last until we finished the prayer. Deep down inside, I was hoping that it would. Once we had finished I opened my eyes with more HOPE than ever to see the candle still burning. That's when I realised this is my learning – the same hope that

- Mary and Joseph had of the new-born
- The Jews had in the coming of the Messiah
- You and I have today and forever that Jesus Christ, the true Son of God, came to this earth for us"

Thankyou and Praise God in the Highest that God understands our needs and loves us. Let us continue this walk of faith together into 2025 – supporting and caring for each other and for those around us.

Graham's New Book


Graham Turner, Rector at St Mike's before Martin, has just had his latest book published.




It's free to take part and takes just one hour to watch either through the window or step outside.





Choral Evensong - with a difference!

When Bishop Sam joined us for Choral Evensong on Sunday- a special service to welcome Vivien as Associate Minister at St Mike's - the choir looked distinctly unusual.

Gone were the usual choir-robes and, instead, members were wrapped in scarves, coats and woolly hats. It was perishingly cold, as the boiler had packed up. Congregation and choir members alike valiantly withstood the challenging temperature and experienced a service to remember (for various reasons).

Welcome, Vivien!

Epiphany

Meaning:

a revealing, a manifestation, a showing forth. Bible readings for Epiphany, in which Jesus is 'manifested' as God's Chosen One:

- The visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus
- The baptism of Jesus
- The wedding at Cana (turning water into wine)
- Jesus preaches in the synagogue at the start of his ministry.

In the Eastern Orthodox Church, the Epiphany is called the **Theophany**, meaning the showing forth or manifestation of the deity (of God)

OMTs:

Woo-hoo!

(No, not that sort - an Occasional Worship Leader!)

Since the Diocese launched this scheme, over 100 people

have trained to be come OWLs (Occasional Worship Leaders).

Dates for three more courses in 2025 are available, in different locations. The next 4-week course for those training to be OWLs starts in Daresbury on 4th February 2025.

The course is for those who find themselves leading worship on an occasional basis, (no more than once a month) and do not feel called to licensed or ordained ministry. The 4-week course in Leading Public Worship is part of the process of becoming a locally authorised Occasional Worship Leader. The course works for people who have been leading worship for years as well as people who are starting out.

Nine at St Michael's undertook this training last year, and you will see them now leading services occasionally.

If you feel this is something you might be interested in, speak in the first place with Revd Martin. If you would like to chat about it to someone who has undertaken the training, our OWLs are Barbara, Catherine, Esther, Heike, Martin B., Paul Simms, Sallie, Sue and Tricia A.


