# Growing Older (and still growing - in wisdom and faith)

Recently I have been deeply moved by the visits and phone calls I have been making and the teaching we have received in church.



Getting older used to be considered positively. Is that because in days of yore people didn't live very long? With age comes wisdom if we are open to learning.

Is not wisdom found among the aged?

Does not long life bring understanding? Job 12:12

In some places older people are still valued. We value things such as wine, cheese and antiques but, sadly, many in our society discount elders as not being of use! This is not the case!

God does not discriminate between people on any characteristics, including age.

Even to your old age and grey hairs I am he, I am he who will sustain you. I have made you and I will carry you; I will sustain you and I will rescue you. Isaiah 46:4

As Christians we are encouraged to look after those who are older, not just those who are our family but also those in our society, especially the church. 1 Timothy 5

I have been blessed and found a wealth of the Spirit in older people, many in their 90s. They really live out the Psalm,

My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever. Psalm 73:26

Their fruit is evident,

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance (patience), kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Galatians 5:22-23



We are taught that, by believing in God and staying connected through the Holy Spirit, we have all the qualities of the fruit (some may be stronger than others). How often do we get caught up in the "doing" of life, like Martha? Certainly, modern life is full of activity and instant responses, next day deliveries. Waiting or stopping is seen negatively. By stopping

is seen negatively. By stopping and slowing down to be present with our Lord, like Mary, we are able to receive. A tea or coffee pot can only be filled if it is set down. (This may be an old-fashioned analogy as we tend to use mugs these days and not wait for it to brew!) Do we set ourselves down and allow ourselves to brew? For the Fruit to develop to maturity we need to stay connected to the tree of life, Jesus, through the Holy Spirit. Sometimes we forget to connect, to set ourselves down and be steeped in God's presence. It is only by taking this time to be filled, like Mary, that we can then be poured out to witness and work for God, to be a better Martha.

Those I visit and telephone witness to the people around them; those with whom they live, carers and health professionals and visitors like myself. The love they share, the joy of being in Christ's presence, their prayerfulness despite the challenges they face is wonderful. Some read the bible daily, others know prayers and services such as Compline (Night Prayer) by heart. Do we?

We all get older day by day. Let those of us who are younger learn from our elders in age and the Spirit. We need to take time to sit with and learn from them. May we make time to be present, to set ourselves down, so that we too can be filled and grow to maturity (including age) full of the Fruit of the Spirit and pour ourselves out as witnesses of Christ's love and compassion to those around us.

Cricketers of all standards are welcomed; as are spectators, umpires and scorers.


Our most recent game - see photo - brought a win against Manchester Tamil Christian Fellowship, but as you can see everyone had a great time.

## The "Open Door" Project -

celebrating 20 years in our "reordered" church building: a new building for a new purpose.



Open Door

If you have joined St Michael's Church

Family in the last 18 or so years, you are probably not aware of the massive change to the building made soon after the millennium, which was spearheaded by a team of wonderful, committed members with a clear vision for the future, and the energy and dedication to see it through.


Our old building wasn't fit for purpose. Old, dark, with no kitchen, office space and poor toilet facilities, we had years of discussion in Church Council meetings mainly about the need for new toilets! Eventually the discussions developed into a scheme for something far greater and more ambitious, along with a repurposed sense of mission and outreach - a building to meet the needs of the whole Macclesfield community.

And so, the Open Door Project took shape (and we left the building for almost two years)!


#### Gordon Darlington remembers:

This weekend marks 20 years on from the first service in St Michael's Church following the completion of the refurbishment works to the building. The work involved transforming a historic town centre church for the 21st Century needs of our members and for future outreach and mission.

On the morning of Sunday, 13<sup>th</sup> June, 2004, a packed congregation, choir and clergy entered the building as music played for the singing of the hymn "Now thank we all our God".

The Open Door Project, as it become known, started a long time ago, in the late 90s with the need to replace the toilets in the old Parish Room.

From the Church Council discussions came the realisation that what the church really required were new facilities throughout the building in a more modern surrounding, where our church members could meet and utilise on a day to day basis as well as sharing amenities with the community of Macclesfield in an open and welcoming atmosphere.

## The question was – could our vision become a reality!

A Steering Group was formed under the leadership of our then Rector, Reverend John Briggs, from which the Project Team developed and was led under the Chairmanship of David Wightman. The project from day one was underpinned by the prayers, enthusiasm and commitment of all the church members.

None of us at that time realised the scale of what we had let ourselves in for and from that moment onwards, our Lord took us all on a Journey of Faith.

Looking back to those early days, we were all tested personally, wrestling with concerns of the project; how can we raise the money required, are there numbers in the congregation able to raise a sum of over a million pounds, and just as concerning how are we going to hold the church together when we would be out of the building for over a year.

Imagine, here we were a team of experienced individuals in our own professional lines of work, tasked in delivering a major project and not being fully in control or providing answers to the many and varied questions.

As the weeks passed, through prayer we began to lay the whole project with its many concerns at our Lords feet, realising that this was <a href="https://example.com/His Project">His Project</a> and he would be with us all the way.

The doubting lifted, the Church Council voted and the Project was given the green light. From the start we were blessed with gifts, generous legacies left to St Michael's over the previous years, also by the commitment and sacrificial support from the congregation, the promise of funds soon reached the necessary amount to appoint our preferred Architect Team.

Throughout the preliminary stages we had gained the support and encouragement of many people including our Diocesan Advisory Committee and a special mention here must go to Cliff Mills, who successfully led us through the Consistory Court proceedings.

Finally, in Spring 2004 after nearly two years the refurbishment of the building was completed.


The support and commitment of the congregation had been matched by the vision and skill of our Architects Barlow, Wright & Phelps of Buxton along with the Design Team, all playing an important role in bringing the scheme together as a first class design.

And finally, but of no less importance, the personnel from our building contractor lan Martin Building Limited for their integrity and detail to quality of workmanship who along with the design team, brought an imaginative scheme to our church building.

And not forgetting the generosity of both local Council and the congregation from the Methodist Church at Whalley Hayes for allowing us to use their buildings and facilities in the Town Hall.

Since the handover of the Project twenty years ago we have had the privilege and the responsibility of this great gift of a building as our base for our Lord's Mission and its foundation built on prayer. Over the years prayer has been at the heart of our mission and as we enter our third decade, our current Rector, Revered Martin Stephens has been handed the task for the mission and worship. Now the Open Doors swing both ways welcoming everyone into our Church and we remember that our mission to which we offer ourselves is not ours. but our Lord's.

# Church's £1.6m facelift moves a g step closer

HISTORIC church building is being brought into the 21st century with a £1.6 million facelift.

facelift.

St Michael's Church, a listed building in the heart of Macclesfield, is more than half way in its bid to become a tourist attraction with a modern makeover.

The stunning exterior of the 700-year-old building will not be touched by the development but there will be major improvements linside.

A welcoming room,

A welcoming room, office, assembly rooms,


A welcoming room, office, assembly rooms, toilets and catering facilities will all be included in the new multi-storey structure.

The main worship area will be adapted for concerts and drama performances and there will be a dedicated youth centre, available for Sunday School and a creche.

Dubbed the Open Door Project, it is hoped the project will make the church more accessible to families and young people in the community.

Canon John Briggs,

Canon John Briggs, e Rector of acclesfield, said: Macclesfield, said:
"Our location makes St Michael's a natural meeting place for those working and shopping in town, as shown by the popularity of the open days held over the summer and

lunchtime services held during Lent and Advent.
"St Michael's is the most historic building in the town and could become a much greater tourist attraction

become a much greater tourist attraction.

"By making the church more available and welcoming, we would hope to benefit Macclesfield as a whole as well as meeting the spiritual needs of a wider group of people, "Improving our facilities for familles and for youth work are key parts of our plan."

More than £800,000 has already been raised or pledged towards the project.

Fundraising events Fundraising events are continuing at the church starting on Sunday when the Rt Revd Michael Baughen, a former Bishop of Chester, will lead a service dedicated to the project.

Then, on Sunday, October 6 there will be a Gift Day service with an opportunity to make donations to the fund.

A well-known histo-rian, Dr Jane Laughton, is producing a book about the histo-ry of the church with proceeds going to the project. Copies of the book will be available early next year.

# Church renovation

# unearths historic artifacts

WHILE preparing for the start of a £1.6 million restoration project at Macclesfield's St Michael's Church, the congregation unearthed treasures dat-ing back hundreds of years that they did not even know existed.

The 'Open Door' project, to improve the facilities inside the 18th century building, is set to begin on June 30 and will take

about eight months to complete.

Work has been underway to catalogue and pack away all the historic items of interest inside the church so they are not damaged when the restoration starts.

#### Amazed

But the volunteers were amazed at the kind of items they have found and stored away – including 17th century helmet and breastplate armour from the time of Oliver Cromwell.

Churchwarden, Kath Langan, said:
"Imagine an old family home full of
ancient heirlooms including irreplaceable
antiques and 100 years worth of family

"We have cupboards full of everything from church music to the angel wings we

use for nativity plays. We must decide what to keep and where and how to store

Macclesfield Camera Club has made a photo-graphic record of the interor of the church so that when the building work is complete, the fittings can be accurately replaced.

The last public viewing of the church as it currently looks will be this weekend when the building will be open for coffee on Saturday and services on Sunday.

After the following week's service on June 29, the church will close until

March 2004 and Sunday morning services will be held in the town hall.

The first major building work at the church for over 100 years will provide a wel-coming area with a manned office, allowing visitors to call in throughout the week.

The main worship area where services are conducted will be adaptable for concerts or drama performanc-

Assembly rooms, with toilets and catering facili-ties, will be included in a new three-storey structure inside the main entrance. The design includes a

glass wall between new and existing parts of the build-ing which will be one of the largest in a British church

The estimated cost of the 'Open Door' project current-ly stands at £1.6 million, but after more than five years of planning, £1.2 million has been raised or pledged. Rector of the church, Canon John Briggs, thanked

Macclesfield Borough Council for providing the town hall for the 10.30am Sunday service, and the Methodist Church in King Edward Street where servic-es will be held at 8.30am and 6.30pm from July 6.

## The Wood-Wide Web

Below are pictures of just some of the different fungi which have appeared on my front lawn over recent months. I love them!

Have you heard of the 'wood-wide web' - the immense network of mycorrhizal fungi underground hidden, yet hard at work in all sorts of wonderful ways, and only emerging occasionally to fruit visibly as toadstools / mushrooms'?

Trees use this network to source nutrients and also even to communicate with each other! In

return they supply the fungi with sugars. Older trees, known as "mother trees" use it to provide shaded seedlings with sugars, giving them a better chance of survival.



Trees also use the fungi to send messages to each other! If they are attacked, they can release chemical signals through their roots which are carried by the fungi and warn their neighbours to raise their defences

When I told a friend I wanted to include some of these pictures in this newsletter, they said, "What's the spiritual point, Lynne?" I hope it's obvious!



Firstly, I hope you are amazed, as I constantly am, by the natural world: God's breathtaking creation and gift to us.

But this image also reminds me of the innumerable people whose quiet Christian lives, like the mycorrhizal fungi, go largely unseen, yet which give support, encouragement and succour to all they meet in their

network of activity, "fruiting" or coming to wider attention unexpectedly and noticeably only from time to time.

This hidden network reminds me of the words at the close of George Eliot's novel, Middlemarch, where the beneficial impact of its heroine Dorothea's quiet life is described thus:



"The effect of her being on those

around her was incalculably diffusive: for the growing good of the world is partly dependent on unhistoric acts, and that things are not so ill with you and me as they might have

been, is half owing to the number who live faithfully a hidden life..."

The whole novel centres on networks, on how each life impacts on so many others, both directly and indirectly. Our impact is similarly diffusive and often unrecognised, but not by Him who sees and understands all. May we use our networks to God's glory and in His name.

For two years, since the arrival of the first refugees from the war (there have since been over 200 refugees arriving in Macclesfield and the surrounding area). St Michael's has hosted on Saturday mornings in the Youth Centre a cafe for the Ukrainian community in Macclesfield.



Here people can meet friends, speak Ukrainian, share experiences and receive support.

The project is supported by Refugees Welcome, One Project Ukraine and the Town Council, and has regularly welcomed on every Saturday over 30 people who have been very grateful for the help they have received.

Most of the refugees are still in Macclesfield, and most have become independent and have integrated very successfully into the life and economy of the town. But some, particularly the older people, still struggle with their English and the traumatic upheaval they have experienced. So, to meet their needs, the cafe now runs once a month on the first Saturday from 10 - 11.30am.



Please feel free to visit and say hello, you will be very welcome. And thanks to all those who have given up their time to steward and serve refreshments and make this vital facility possible.



#### 28th-30th June

Join the Macclesfield Town Council's initiative for a weekend of art, entertainment, making and partaking.

Named for the town's charter year, the 1261 Festival plans to be a celebration of Macclesfield's creativity and community. We'll be offering live music, workshops, exhibitions, activities, street theatre, walking tours and loads more.

Things are kicking off early on Saturday at the Library, which will be open from 9am to help tiny hands make the most colourful paper crowns and flags, ready to cheer on the One World Parade, setting off from the Town Hall at 11am.

Co-ordinated by Macclesfield Community ArtSpace the parade will be showcasing community groups from every corner of Macc, with some of the floats available to view in the St. Michaels Church Yard after the parade returns.

There's plenty of other activities to keep you busy on Saturday, from Christ Church to the Silk Museum and a few walking tours to take you everywhere in between. When you're ready to take a breather there are deckchairs and benches waiting for you in Market Place amongst our mini street-food market, or just take a stroll and enjoy the street entertainers with a take-away from your favourite Macc coffee shop.

Spanning across the weekend, from Friday evening to Sunday afternoon will be 1261: The After Party, co-ordinated by Choose Macc. The After Party events will be taking place in venues all over town, with access to all events being granted via a special 1261: The After Party wristband. # LIGHTS!!!



Church members, and especially those who hire our building, have been complaining about our lighting for years.

Although it was new in 2004, the metal halide technology has not stood the test of time and is very greedy for electricity (so is costly both to the environment and to us). It has now got to the point where we hirers are choosing to go elsewhere, and it will only get worse. The future is LED lighting, with easily-selected settings for different scenarios (concerts, services etc). After several years of exploring options, suppliers and designs this project is now under way.

CBG consultants, recommended by our architects, have come up with a scheme for the worship area and Savage Chapel, which has, of course, to be approved by the Diocesan Advisory Committee, but we hope that the installation work can start early in 2025.

You can see some drawings and illustrations on a board in the north aisle.

The cost of this scheme will be somewhere in the region of £100,000, (depending on the contractor) and we can only consider this thanks to an extremely generous legacy we received from the late John Edwards. We are very, very grateful to John for considering St Michael's in his will. Our legacy policy is that legacies should be dedicated to a specific improvement project rather than general running expenses, and we are absolutely delighted that, in this case, the legacy is enabling us to progress the much-needed lighting project.
