When we share in Holy Communion we gather at a Table. In writing this I am sharing a few of the thoughts that have been percolating in my brain over the last few weeks.

What is a table? This seems like a daft question! A table can be the flat, level board supported by legs at which we sit or stand to eat or work. When eating, the table is laid

ready for people to gather. For work purposes items required are set out ready for use. A table can also be a grid in which information is clearly displayed. We can also bring something 'to the table', not just food or work, but ideas, propositions.

Day to day our Table in church is set; laid out with items having meaning which relay information to help us in our faith.

- Cloth it is laid with a white cloth, usually of fine linen. Being fine, white linen it shows that it is a special place and helps to "show off" the items on it.
- Frontal this has a design pertaining to the Christian season of the year and is changed accordingly to follow the Church calendar.
- Candles the two white candles are lit during services representing the purity of Christ and that he is both God and human.
- Cross the empty cross is the sign of the Christian faith. Christ died on the cross for us but did not stay dead.
- Bible the Bible is our handbook for living a Christian life.
- At other times there may be flowers (signs of God's creation) or, for example, the Posada (Mary, Joseph and the donkey).



For Holy Communion there is a special setting, whether in the church building or for visits made to people in their homes. The Paten and Chalice contain the bread (wafers) and wine which are consecrated (prayed over and given for a special purpose) by the priest. This special meal is for us to share in remembrance of what Jesus did for us, just as he requested. 'And he (Jesus) took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after the supper he

took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you." Luke 22:19-20



Even though our last pilgrimage ended only a couple of weeks ago, we are already planning our pilgrimage for 2025 - a residential this time.

We are planning to do the 3 - 4 day route and, as usual, shorter routes will be available for those who don't want to walk the full distance.

Art Exhibition


John Staveley

Reducing your carbon footprint

The eco-church group would like to share your experiences of investing in energy-saving initiatives or life-style changes. It might be buying an electric

car to replace your diesel, giving up eating meat, installing an air-source heat pump, or avoiding flying.

Here is the first contributor: Alan Wootton fitted solar panels and a battery; and improved his loft insulation, in June 2023.

The cost of the solar panels, including inverter and a 5 kWh battery, came to approximately \pounds 15,000. The loft insulation was done professionally for \pounds 1000; but you might decide to do this yourself. He decided not to fit cavity wall insulation at this stage.

The house heating is almost entirely by gas: a boiler with radiators and a gas fire in the living room. The gas is not used for anything else. The living room thermostat is set moderately high to 21 C, and bedroom radiators have separate thermostats set to about 15 C. During the summer for about 3 months he turns off the gas, and uses the electric immersion heater for domestic hot water.

Many thanks Alan for this very detailed and useful analysis.

We think the financial savings – 56% reduction in energy bills – speak for themselves; although you do need the cash to invest upfront. On top of this is the satisfaction of reducing his consumption of gas, marginally, and electricity, massively – and therefore also reducing his own carbon footprint. A small but significant contribution to slowing the rate of climate change.

The Assisted Dying Bill 2024



Proposals to give terminally ill people in England and Wales the right to choose to end their life are to be introduced in the House of Commons this month.

The bill is expected to be formally introduced on 16 October, with a debate and initial vote likely to take place later this year. It would have to be approved by MPs and peers before it becomes law.

The details have not been finalised but the bill is likely to be similar to the Assisted Dying for Terminally III Adults Bill which has been introduced in the House of Lords, by former Labour Justice Secretary Lord Falconer. The bill would allow terminally ill adults with six months or fewer to live to get medical help to end their own lives. Their choice would also need to be approved by two doctors and the high court. Lord Falconer said his bill would apply only to people "mentally able to make the decision".

But Dr Lucy Thomas, a palliative care and public health doctor, said assisted dying was a last resort that courts, rather than doctors, were better placed to judge. She believes that doctors should never be put in a position where they might feel obliged to assist someone in taking their own life, while accepting that no doctor would be forced to take such decisions

The UK's highest-ranking Catholic bishop has urged churchgoers to lobby their MPs to oppose proposed changes in the law around, warning people: "be careful what you wish for". In a letter to be read out in the churches of his diocese, Cardinal Vincent Nichols said the proposed changes risk bringing about "a slow change from a duty to care to a duty to kill" for medical professionals.

Many people are concerned about the impact of pressure, perceived or real, from their families on terminally ill patients to opt for assisted dying.

This is a hugely complex issue, but one on which our MP Tim Roca will be voting in the near future. He is our representative, and I hope he will reflect the views of the majority of his constituents. But who is he listening to?

It is estimated that two thirds of the adult population of the UK believes that assisted dying should be legalised during this parliament.

It's clearly a moral and ethical issue as well as a medical and scientific one; should we be having a discussion about it at St Michael's?


The young people compete in two age groups, and the winner of each group is invited to represent Chester at the National Final, held early in 2025.
