St Michael's Priorities

At Choral Evensong last Sunday, the Old Testament reading was Exodus 14:5-31 –



the account of Moses and the Israelites crossing the Red Sea, fleeing enslavement from Egypt.

I used the occasion to speak about NOT hankering after the *status quo* – where things just continue "as they were, are now, and forever shall be"!

In our day, a distressing illustration of this are the sobering statistics from several parishes in the nation which, without a miracle, will surely close in the not-too-distant future without new people to take up the mission there. Some people, it seems, just want their churches to stay the same.

How do we in Macclesfield, and especially at St Michael's, avoid being like them?

As part of our longer-term strategy, our Church Council recently adopted the following three priorities, to help focus collectively our minds and energies for the next 18 months or so

Growing Younger - Growing Deeper - Growing Stronger

The Church Council Teams will use these priorities to guide their discussions, helping ensure each Team's activities contribute positively to at least one of these areas.

Growing Younger

I've suggested we aim to lower the average age of the worshipping community by 5 years. Not knowing everyone's age I don't know exactly what that figure is, but you get the idea.



And it's not just about children and young families but the whole age range.

If visitors (older and younger) were to encounter God through St Michael's, what change of mindset do you need to help them choose to worship regularly with us and decide to belong?

Growing Deeper

By my reckoning, in the past year, fewer than a quarter of our church membership (defined as the Electoral Roll) has attended anything beyond regular worship with the specific intention of developing their faith. Okay, maybe there are more of you who do – just that I'm not aware of who you are.

Growing deeper is about each of us taking a level of responsibility for our own faith development AND it's about St Michael's increasing the opportunities for people to do this.

Specifically, at Church Family Worship this Sunday, the 'Connecting People' Team will talk about opportunities to join a housegroup; and this week marks the start of the latest Alpha Course being led by Sue & Kev, and the Romans Course, being led by Mike and Lynne. Maybe you just need a nudge to join them, bring a friend.

Growing Stronger

We have a visiting guest preacher at the end of the month, when we'll hear more about the precious opportunities of being a Town Centre Church. We know St Michael's is an impressive yet busy church. We have finite resources (of people, time and money) and we have many existing

demands – several relating to the building, unfortunately.

Growing Stronger is about seeking to ensure we have sufficient resources (of people, time and money) to do all we want to, as well as all we need to (pages 2 & 3 of this newsletter highlight this). Please consider your part in helping

I'm also aware not everyone will relate to some of the references; take a look at the peach-coloured 'Welcome to all' leaflet and the little tri-fold 'Our focus for the future' leaflet – both available in the Welcome Area.

Our Church Kitchen

St Michaels Church Kitchen is more than just a normal Church Kitchen. It is more... SOOO much more.



The food it serves is not just food, it is 'Saving the Planet' food. And sometimes 'Saving the soul' food. For some people it is literally 'keeping them alive' food.

The church building is open every day and so are the Cafes which are staffed almost exclusively by volunteers. We have five different offerings of the café experience at various times of the week, so a massive thankyou to all the volunteers and to Ali, our kitchen manager for making this happen.

The After Sunday-Service Café



This has been happening for many years. It is an essential offering to foster conversation and friendship, especially for visitors who are not sure what to do with themselves. Tea, coffee, biscuits - simple and quick (very important!) – and, like the other offerings, short of volunteers. Two are needed each Sunday, prepared to set up beforehand, leave the service early and stay afterwards

to clear up. **Mark Langham** (pictured) manages the rota for this; please speak to him if you'd like to get involved.

The Treacle Sunday café



This s open after the church service on Treacle Sunday morning until 3.00pm, serving tea, coffee and biscuits. Several hundred visitors, including people who visit from far afield, come through our doors to experience the hospitality and the history. You'd be surprised at how many of them have never been inside a church before even though they may have lived in Macclesfield all their lives. They are greeted by friendly smiles and a shelter from the

rain or busyness of the market. Throughout the day we need a minimum of 10 volunteers, four for the café and six for the tour guides. Contact **Vicky Darlington** (pictured) for more information.

The Open Door Café



This is from Monday to Wednesday from 10.00am – 12.00 midday, serving tea, coffee, toast, teacakes and biscuits at very reasonable prices. We need a minimum of six volunteers every week and six more on the list to cover absences or emergencies. Contact **Eve Budgett** (pictured) if you want more information. It is an easygoing, non-pressurised volunteering experience. We need people who are friendly and willing to spend time listening to and chatting with visitors at tables.

The Angel at my Table Café.



From Thursday to Saturday we have a **Surplus Food**

Café which is open from 10.00am - 3.00pm, serving lunches, tea, coffee, sandwiches toast and delicious homemade cakes. This is a completely different volunteering experience because it can be very busy, especially if there is an event on in the Market Place or in the church itself. If you are able to volunteer for this you need to be prepared for cheeky banter and to be able to work under pressure, taking instructions from the kitchen manager (who may be doing five things at once), without taking offence. The bonus is that it is a great training experience for working in a professional kitchen. Ideally, we need three shifts of two volunteers for each shift (three shifts) and more on busy days. So, a list of people that can be relied upon to attend at a regular time each week is vitally important, and so is another list of folks who can be called upon at short notice. Contact Ali Griffen (Kitchen Manager) for more information.



Foodie Friday is connected to Angel at my Table and is a special event held once a month on Friday evening. The guests arrive between 6.00-6.30 for a three-course meal, with all dietary requirements considered. It is a very popular event and it is almost always fully booked. For this to happen, volunteers are needed who will help prepare the food such as chopping vegetables, making cakes, following instructions from the Kitchen Manager. Other volunteers needed are front of house: their task is to set up the tables, take orders from the guests and wait on at tables. Again, anyone volunteering for this needs to be prepared to work under pressure and be prepared for friendly banter and even some singing. To make this happen we need at least two volunteers to help with preparation of food as soon as the cafe closes at 3.00pm and two to help with front of house, from 4.00pm. We usually leave the building about 9.30pm on Foodie Fridays. Money raised from this event goes towards covering the cost of providing free meals during the week. Why do we do this?

In everything we do as part of St Michael's Church family we are doing it to show the love of God – to show people that we care for them because God cares for them.

We also do it because we want to show that we love one another, that the family of the church looks out for one another. We each have our different roles, characters and skills – none are more important than any others. We need to accept that and we need to encourage each other in the task that they have been given to do. Even if the thing that God has given another person to do is not to my liking, I have to respect that and to do what I can to support them in their ministry. It is not my ministry and that's okay, but it is their ministry.

The characteristics of the early church help us to understand how God intends his family to behave, as St Paul says in his letter to the **Ephesians Chapter 4**. We often refer to 'my church' but what we forget is that it is God's church and it is God's kitchen! We just run it in the best way we can.



And later on, in the same chapter, Paul says that we have all been given different gifts. But why? What for? Well, it's simple – to live as children of God, to live as God always intended humans to live.

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In addition to this, the initiative which has become known as Angel at my Table is fulfilling some other of God's commands – in particular to feed the hungry and to look after creation.

Many people and particularly those of a certain generation cannot abide food waste or waste of any kind. One of the shames of our western society is how much food is thrown away when there are also thousands of families who can't afford to buy food; not to mention all those millions around the world who struggle to get any nourishment at all. The Surplus Food Grocery and cafes seek to address this challenge.



The St Barnabas Grocery, based at the Church on Moss Rose fighting hunger, Estate, collects food from town and also from

Fairshare in Manchester. This food has been deemed surplus to requirements for several reasons – it may be close to its Best Before Date or it may have been over-ordered by the buyer. Most of this food is still perfectly edible. Once the food has been collected by the drivers it is sorted into food types and the Surplus Food Grocery opens in the St Barnabas Church Hall and other locations in the town.

Anyone can go along and buy an amazing amount of food for £5. You don't have to be struggling for cash - this food is available for those who on ethical grounds believe it is just plain wrong to be throwing away good food. Not only that, it is wasting the planet's resources....

Answering the question, "why do we do this?", on a different level it is to keep the building, including the Savage Family Chapel, open and available for the community, as a place to rest and reflect, to meet others, even to pray. We are amazed at how many come in to sit and pray, or light a candle in the Chapel. The friendly café volunteer may be the only person someone gets to speak to all day.

Thank you for reading this long article and please think carefully about whether you or someone you know could join this merry band of volunteers. They don't have to be church members or particularly skilled (training is provided). Maybe there are youngsters off school or college and at a loose end, or people who have recently retired or been made redundant, folk who are looking for work experience.

The theme this year was **Dream On** - a better world is possible, if we act on our dreams to make a real difference in the



real world. For a long weekend we were challenged to dream, to act, to make, to imagine, to give, to love, to be. It was like a taste of heaven!

10000 of us shared communion on Sunday morning in the Glade, the main outdoor venue, and shared virtually with the community at Tent of Nations in the West Bank. We experienced the trauma of having to move with all our belongings to sit elsewhere - at no notice. This experience gave us a taste of the refugee experience - and it is hoped an insight into the lives of so many in Gaza, Ukraine, Sudan, Syria and elsewhere. But the worship was great and left us hopeful that, yes, a better world is possible.

The most difficult part of Greenbelt is deciding what to do; there are usually 7 or 8 things you could be doing at any time. The choice is both wonderful and bewildering. We watched a 70-minute one-man play called The Beloved Son, about the theologian and L'Arche volunteer Henri Nouwen. We enjoyed a Friday night Shabbat meal cooked by the Jewish chef Judi Rose. We found out about the work of the Pickwell Foundation in supporting asylum seekers. We enjoyed some stunning sunsets and beautiful starscapes.

We plan to go again next year. Rachel & David

The Season of Creation got off to a wonderful start.




Anyone for a 1000-piece jigsaw?




The first concert of this term is on Friday 20th September at 1.15pm and features mezzo-soprano Imogen Garner accompanied by pianist John Gould.

These will be displayed and offered for sale.



The Tamil Christian Fellowship, attended on Saturdays by Esther, Vijay & family, enjoyed a weekend away last weekend.




